Amazing Rock Trivia

- Tourmalines and Quartz will develop an electrical charge when heated, and tourmaline jewelry will attract dust when displayed under hot lights.
- There is no such thing as "Jade" green "jade" is one of two different minerals, Jadeite or nephrite. Jadeite is the more valuable of the two.
- The second most valuable color of jadeite is layender
- You can dig and pan for colored gemstones such as emerald, aquamarine, moonstones, garnet, citrine, amethyst, ruby, and sapphire at Gem Mountain in Spruce Pine, NC.
- There is a man made brilliant white stone called moissanite, which can fool a jewelry store diamond tester. (Depending on what type tester they have).
- The big "ruby" in the royal crown of England is actually a red spinel.
- Ivory imitations are carved from corozo nuts, tagua nuts, and duom palm nuts.
- If allowed to sit in moist or humid conditions too long, hematite jewelry has such a high iron content it will rust.
- Jet, made popular for use in jewelry by Queen Victoria in the 19th century, is actually a type of fossilized coal formed 180 million years ago from trees.
- It takes one to three years to grow a cultured pearl (or more).
- Goldstone is not a stone it is a glass containing copper powder that gives it aventurescence (quick bright flashes of light).
- "Black Onyx" is actually orange and brown sardonyx that has been dyed black, and should be

- cleaned carefully to avoid removing the dye and dulling this porous quartz.
- Cultured pearls are made by inserting a small shell bead into an oyster or clam as an irritant, and waiting years for the shellfish to cover the bead with its luscious nacre
- Amethysts can fade if exposed to too much sun.
- Historically, before science could tell minerals apart, all yellow stones were called "topaz".
- Rubies were synthesized in the late 1800's and sellers actually charged more for the synthetics than the natural rubies.
- Pearls, by law, must be called "cultured pearls" unless they are completely natural, and most pearls sold today are cultured.
- "Herkemer Diamonds" are actually double terminated quartz.
- "Smokey Topaz" is not topaz it is actually brown quartz.
- Radiation causes diamonds to turn green.
- Some diamonds are artificially (and safely) irradiated to achieve a green color but early on, before the process was refined, some greed diamonds were actually made radioactive, and are confiscated by the U.S. Government if found today.
- A new process has recently been developed to achieve a green color in diamonds using just pressure and heat.
- In ancient times, the term "sapphire" meant all blue stones, but usually lapis lazuli – which was considered the most expensive stone in the world

Fourth Edition of our AFMS/FRA Badge Manual Now Posted!

I was appointed CFMS Juniors Activities Chair in 1998 and then AFMS Juniors Program Chair in 2003. I immediately set to work developing a nation-wide Badge Program modeled after the Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts. Month-by-month in the AFMS Newsletter, I outlined ideas for badges, and—with approval from AFMS officers and generous support of the AFMS Endowment Fund, which I cannot thank enough—we began offering our AFMS Future Rockhounds of America Badge Program entirely free to affiliated clubs and societies nationwide in 2004.

At the time I indicated if the program proved successful, my goal was to update and expand it every 4 years. With well over 11,000 badges now awarded to kids nationwide, I'm happy to report we have proven successful! 558 kids have been awarded the Rockhound badge by earning at least 6 of the activity badges, and 26 kids have earned coveted Rock Star status by having earned each and every badge in the program. Their names are recorded on our AFMS Kids Corner website in Honor Rolls recognizing their achievements. (My sincere thanks to Marty Hart for his always helpful, cheerful, unfailing and consistent assistance with the AFMS website these many years.)

The first edition of my Badge Manual offered 9 badges and 53 activities. Staying true to plan, I've updated and expanded it in 2008 and 2012 (with a minor update in 2010), and I'm now pleased to report I have sent the 2016 edition to Marty to post on the AFMS website. This 4th Edition offers 20 badges and 130 activities. As with past editions, many new activities were suggested by the junior leaders of local clubs. In fact, one of the badges introduced in our 3rd Edition was designed by a junior member, Rock Star Erica Nathan of Florida. Similarly, in our 4th Edition another junior member—Rock Star Jem Burch of California—suggested an "Elements" activity you'll now find as part of our Rocks & Minerals badge.


For the 4th Edition, I issued requests for new badge ideas via the AFMS and CFMS newsletters, and I thank the 22 people who responded with suggestions. There

were no overwhelming calls to add whole new badges. Some suggested adding Ele- ments, Prospecting, and Beading badges, but because of manufacturing expenses a whole new badge incurs, I've opted in- stead to include these ideas as new activities within the existing badges for Rocks & Minerals, Gold Panning & Prospecting, and Lapidary Arts.


