Here we are back to field trip weather again. I was reading an article about moistening rocks or slabs to check how well they would shine with polishing a couple of days ago. The prime thing I got out of the article was to *never*, *never* lick them with your *tongue*. Aside from the obvious sanitary problems this could cause many rocks around the Midwest have arsenic in or on them.

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Fredericksburg Rockhounds 50th Anniversary

The hobby of rock hounding is so multi-faceted it has the interest of a wide span of people. As part of the Fredericksburg Rockhounds Club's 50th Anniversary, we are writing a series of biographies for some long time (not old) members. It is our hope you will see the diversity of people that are interested in rock hounding.

This month we feature Glenn Thompson (#articleb) and Chester Hohmann (#articlec).

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Glenn Thompson

A Biography –

Glenn Thompson was born and raised on a farm in South Dakota. He was the only student in his class during his eight years in a small, rural elementary school near Crooks, South Dakota. At Lyons High School, he was a member of the largest class ever enrolled up to that time— seventeen students. Dr. Thompson has degrees from Augustana College, the University of South Dakota and the University of Minnesota, with postgraduate work at the University of North Dakota and the McPhail Institute of Music. During a 39-year career as an educator, Glenn served as a public school band and orchestra director, a K-12 librarian and audiovisual director, a university reference and periodicals librarian, and a university professor and department chairman. During the final decade of his career, he taught coursework via interactive television. Glenn holds the rank of Professor Emeritus in the Wisconsin University System.

Glenn and his wife Agnes (Aggie) have been married for 59 years; they have two children. Aggie has Bachelor's and Master's Degrees in Home Economics Education from the University of Wisconsin-Stout, with postgraduate work in Special Education. She worked for 21 years as an instructor in a private residential academy serving incarcerated and emotionally-disturbed youth. Glenn and Aggie retired to an acreage north of Fredericksburg in 1997 to escape brutal northern winters. They raised Barbados sheep, chickens, cats, dogs and a donkey named Hermano. Their property is presently registered as a wildlife management site.

Glenn and Aggie joined the Fredericksburg Rockhounds in 1998. Glenn has served as Historian, Secretary and President (twice) and on various ad hoc committees. He especially enjoys collecting and working with fluorescent minerals. He also enjoys reading (he has a collection of several thousand books), working on the computer (he maintains the website www.tractorfriends.org) and collecting and restoring old lawnmowers and tractors. He delights in a collection of some three-dozen dead or dying lawnmowers, garden tractors and compact tractors, much to the chagrin of his wife, who would prefer that he devote his time to something that doesn't clutter up the place so much—like stamp collecting. In recent years, Glenn has had several articles on antique engines and tractors published in national journals. Both Glenn and Aggie enjoy music; Aggie has had a lengthy career as a church organist and at present enjoys playing the piano for residents in local nursing homes and retirement centers.

Although an octogenarian, Glenn enjoys excellent health and is likely to plague Rockhounds officers for some time to come. His mother lived to be 101+, in spite of (or possibly because of) a regular diet of foods fried in lard or bacon fat.

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Chester Hohmann

A Biography —

Chester Hohmann's grandfather was a rancher, as was Chester's father, so it didn't surprise anyone when Chester also became a rancher. Except for brief periods when he attended college and served in the military, Chester spent his entire life in the Fredericksburg area.

Chester was born in 1930 and attended St. Mary's Elementary School and High School in Fredericksburg. Upon graduation from high school he enrolled in St. Mary's University in San Antonio and graduated four years later with a major in Business Administration and a minor in Economics. Chester didn't really have a chance to take a deep breath before he found high in the Army—first in Tokyo and then in his final deployment in Korea. The Korean War was over, so there wasn't muc for artillerymen. Chester chuckles when he recalls that one by one the men in his unit either completed their tours or Privacy - Terms

and were sent home or were deployed elsewhere until finally there were basically only officers, cooks and sentries left. The officers continued to officiate, the cooks continued to cook, and the guards continued to man their posts; however, it was all without purpose.

After finishing his two-year stint in the military, Chester returned to Fredericksburg and resumed working as a rancher; however, like many ranchers then and now, he also had a "day job" to help make ends meet. For a while he had part-time work as a sports writer for the Fredericksburg Standard Radio Post; later he worked at St. Mary's Credit Union. During his final two years at the Credit Union, he and another employee served as managers.

Chester met and married Ruby Alderman in 1956. Ruby's older brothers had nicknamed her "Midget," which became "Midge" as she grew older. Over the years, Midge worked in the Fredericksburg Public Schools and St. Mary's Parochial Schools in a variety of positions— Speech Diagnostician, Speech Therapist, Special Education Teacher and Classroom Teacher. Midge was known to have said that she taught so that Chester could be a rancher, and he readily admits that the income she brought home was important to the well-being of their family. Chester and Midge had four children, three of whom are still living. Sadly, Midge passed away in 2009.

Chester enjoyed playing baseball. He played while he was in school, he played during the time he was in the Army and he played after he returned to civilian life. He was First-Baseman for the Fredericksburg Giants and Pat's Cubs. More recently, Chester has enjoyed deer hunting and he is an amateur photographer, with a large collection of 35mm slides—mostly of wildlife subjects. Of particular interest are the photos he took while in Japan and Korea.

Chester doesn't remember exactly when he and Midge joined the Fredericksburg Rockhounds, but it would have been during the early 1960's—not long after the formation of the Fredericksburg Club in 1958. He thinks that they were invited to join the Club by friends. Once members, they were active. Midge served as Secretary and Chester was Show Chairman. The Club was quite small, with only about twenty members. Meetings were held in the Ag Building which was located in the then Market Square on the east side of Highway 16, across from the present Court House. Chester doesn't remember when the Club moved to the American Legion Hall. The Annual Gem and Mineral Show was the Club's big event then, as now, and every member had to pitch in and help. There were few vendors—only about four—but many of the members had exhibits and some demonstrated cutting, polishing, faceting and other lapidary arts. The annual shows were well attended, beginning with the first show in 1959.

The Fredericksburg Rockhounds did not sponsor many field trips during the Club's early years and they were usually day trips to nearby sites, with occasional trips extending as far as West Texas or the Rio Grande Valley. Club members tended to go rock hounding as individuals or couples—sometimes to remote sites such as Alaska, Russia and South America. Chester has accumulated rocks and minerals that interest him personally, but he hasn't actively attempted to develop a large or organized collection. Of particular interest to him are his Native American artifacts—many of which he found on his own ranch.

Ranching (as well as rock hounding) is not for the faint-of-heart and Chester has vivid memories of past injuries. He has had three broken wrists, two broken ribs, two broken hips, a knee replacement, and life-threatening blows to his face and abdomen.

Chester has enjoyed meeting with friends at the Germany Bakery in Fredericksburg, but naturally that is not possible while he is confined with a broken hip to Knopp Nursing Home and Rehabilitation Center No. 2 (in Fredericksburg on Billie Drive over by the High School). He would welcome Rockhound members that would care to visit him there.




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Club Info

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Monthly Meeting Map


